Book Review

THE BOOK OF ABRAHAM by Marek Halter

Original, French edition © 1983 by *Editions Robert Laffont, S.A.*

Even though titled a novel, it is much more than that. It is even more than the introduction of the flap which says in part: "...an amazing work of historical fiction, covering two thousand years of a hundred generations " – from 70 A.D. to the destruction of the Warsaw Ghetto, which the author survived.

In Italian, a translator is a *traduttore* and a traitor is a *tradittore*. This work is more than a "Book". The word *mémoire* has several meanings in French. It can be your "memory", it can be an abstract or dissertation, it can be a memorial, it can be the philosophical or physical part of your mind where information is kept. In any case it indicates resisting the passage of time.

The mythical progenitor of the family is named Abraham, the scribe who fled the burning of Jerusalem when it was conquered by the Roman legions. To keep the family tradition alive he made a parchment that was to be transmitted from generation to generation, each generation adding to it, hence the name, THE MEMORY OF ABRAHAM. Marek's own grandfather was an Abraham who perished in the uprising of

the Warsaw Ghetto, just before modern Jewish interest in genealogy blossomed.

Fictional up to the Fiftenth Century, the generations live through the Jewish persecutions of all the ages. From then on, it is the history of the author's family.

The French introduction mentions that there are no evil Jewish characters in the book, as works from others have supplied more than enough.

Each of the forty-eight chapters can be read separately, as each covers the lives of one, two or three generations.

In conclusion, let me just give a quote from Shimon Peres about the book: "A fascinating portray al of our people... a story of suffering and hope, longing and wandering, struggle and achievement... A wonderful epic which deserves to be used as required text in our schools...An exceptional book." — Robert Neu &

Jews and the Spanish Inquision, Part II – Was Columbus Jewish?

Five hundred years after the arrival of Columbus in the New World, historians still labor to unravel the mysteries surrounding his life. Columbus himself contributed to the enigma. He seemed determined to hide certain facts about his life even from his own family. In the past decade, through newly published works, we are given a new perspective of this remarkable man.

After his first voyages, Columbus spent three years, from 1500 to 1503, preparing a small document which he called The Book of Prophecies. It was to convince the Spanish monarchs, Isabel and Ferdinand, of the need for further exploration in the New World, led by himself. The book is a collection of "pro-

phecies," references from the Old Testament and early Christian writers about those dwelling upon the isles of the seas, the Lord's concern for them, and

therefore the need for converting them to Christianity.

His book was translated and appeared in English under the bilingual title, THE LIBRO DE PROFECIAS OF CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS, by West and Kling, published by University of Florida Press in 1991. Included in the book are Columbus's expressions about his own deep spiritual feelings:

Mine is a calling that inclines those who pursue it to desire to understand the world's secrets.. I prayed to the most merciful Lord concerning my desire, and he gave me the

spirit and the intelligence for it. He gave me abundant skill in the mariner's arts, an adequate understanding of the stars, and of geometry and arithmetic. He gave me the mental capacity and the manual skill to draft spherical maps. The Lord opened my mind to the fact that it would be possible to sail from here to the Indies . . . This was the fire that burned within me . . . Who can doubt that this fire was not just mine, but also of the Holy Spirit which encouraged me. (West & Kling, pp.105, 107)

A second work of recent years on Columbus is COLOM IEL MON CATALA (Columbus and the Catalan World), published in 1993 in Barcelona, Spain, by the *Centre*

d'Estudis Colombins.
This is a collection of studies by various researchers and deals with the Catalan influences in Columbus' life.

For instance, new

information is given on the two men who financed Columbus' first voyage, Luis Santangel and Gabriel Sanxis. They were Catalans, both of Jewish descent, and held positions of importance in King Ferdinand's kingdom. Santangel was the king's Comptroller and Sanxis, General Treasurer of Aragon, both key financial posts. Their importance to Ferdinand is shown in his protection of them from the Inquisition. And it was their money, not Isabel's jewels, that paid for Columbus's ships.

COLOM I EL MON CATALA also presents

arguments that Columbus was Catalan. During his return from his first voyage he wrote letters to these two men telling of his discoveries. The Santangel letter is described in an inventory which Columbus' son kept of his father's papers, wherein he says, "Letter written [to Santangel] in 1493 in Catalan." And Columbus signed his name in official documents as "Colom," the Catalan version of his surname. Still more Catalan evidence is found in Columbus' coat-of-arms, in which appears the phrase: "For Castille and for Leon, a New World Found Colom."

The name Colom itself has great symbolism. In Catalan, *colom* means dove. So we can say that Colom, like Noah's dove of the Ark, crossed mighty waters in search of a new land. The Colom family of Mayorca still uses the coat-of-arms of a "Noah dove," pictured flying over waves with a leaf in its mouth.

The Catalan connection includes the idea

that Columbus was Jewish, which would explain many questions about his life: his rich educational background, typically Jewish, his knowledge of Old Testament prophecies and Greek classical writings, his relationship with *marranos* such as Santangel and Sanxis, the secrecy surrounding his early life.

Among the Catalan people, inhabitants of the northeast area of Spain and the islands of Mallorca [pronounced "Mayorca" – ed.] and Menorca, there is a strong Hebrew heritage. The surname Colom is common in all this area. Montjuich,

mountain of the Jews, is a prominent landmark of Barcelona. During the Middle Ages, cartography, or map making, was considered an exclusively Catalan Jewish profession, and the Mayorca school of cartography was famous.

In his BOOK OF PROPHECIES, Columbus expresses his belief that it was Divine will that decreed he fill this mission. This conviction, he says, is what sustained him through the seven long years of waiting at the court. He then explains, "I will speak of a particular prophecy, because it applies particularly to my experience, and it comforts me and fills me with joy every time I think of it." (West & Kling, p. 111) The passage quoted is Isaiah 60, verses 8 and 9:

"Who are these that fly as a cloud, and as the doves to their windows? Surely the isles shall wait for me, and the ships of Tarshish first, to bring thy sons from far, their silver and their gold with them, unto

the name of the Lord thy God, and to the Holy One of Israel." An analysis of this passage in the light of modern scholarship is revealing.

• "These that fly as a **cloud''** – Columbus's ships were "caravels," a new type of smaller and lighter construction used by the Spanish and Portuguese for ocean exploration during the 1500's and 1600's. Built with a broad bow, these ships sat higher in the water, and with their three sails were able to travel at great speed impelled by the wind. Indeed, it was the caravel

that made poss-ible the long sea voy ages that marked the age of discovery. (From Webster's Dictionary)

• "As doves to their windows" – Here

Columbus's name, the dove Colom, speaks out to him from Isaiah. And here also is an allusion to the "Noah dove" returning to the "windows" of the Ark after having successfully crossed mighty waters in search of land

- "The isles shall wait for me" Did not an entire hemisphere remain hidden from the world until this man made his discovery?
- "The ships of Tarshish first" Biblical scholars fix the location of Tarshish (or Tartessus) as having been on the southwest coast of Spain. This would place it near Palos, Columbus's port of departure. "The ships of Tarshish first" the Columbus ships, first to venture out across the broad western seas.
- "Thy sons from far, their silver and their gold with them" And as a final historical fact, in order to substantiate his story, Columbus brought back with him from the Americas eight Indians and native crafts made of gold and silver.

For Columbus, the prophet Isaiah's scripture had great personal meaning. With good reason he could state that the mere thought that it applied "particularly" to him, gave him immense "comfort" and "joy." Present-day scholarship allows us to gain a new perception of Columbus and to appreciate his greatness even more. \$\preceq\$

[Lest anyone object that Columbus was known to be an Italian from Genoa, Robert Neu points out that there is also a Genoa in Majorca, a type of confusion especially familiar to all Jewish genealogists. – Ed.]

Digest of September UJGS Meeting Minutes

Robert announced that November's agenda should be to review/approve by-laws and constitution of UJGS. Passed.

Don Fallick updated the group re: newsletter. E-mail production is best since it saves money; however, one member needs a hard copy. Can get back issues. We email 70 copies of each issue. Articles are continually needed. We need to have a thorny problem dogging some-one for next issue. We now have capacity to

include photos and color. Next issue will complete SLC Jewish Cemetery project and will contain highlights of Rochelle's trip to Latvia and Lithuania to explore one part of her family history.

Don Fallick would like to present on "*Books of Remembrance*". This was to be added to the November agenda but will be pushed back to a later meeting.

Robert circulated *Avotaynu* issues, photocopied material of Eileen Hallett Stone study guide handout, and materials/binder from IAJGS Conference in DC in July.

UJGS website, now only one page, is up, courtesy of Daniel Schlyter.

Robert Neu and Rochelle Kaplan reported their news from the conference.

IAJGS changed one by-law: there are now no term limits for any officers except the President, who may be elected for two terms. Officers serve 2-year terms. Dan Schlyter, one of our members, is an IAJGS board member.

The JCLLA and IAJGS announced a lending film library, through JCLLA. To scan the catalogue, check out this website: www.jclla.org. The only cost to the borrower is return shipping to LA.

Don suggested that we could view a film during a meeting; or, a member could view a film; then write a review. We might even have a film review column. He recommended *Partisans of Vilna*, which was shown at IAJGS Film Series, and also the book upon which it was based: *The Avengers: Partisans of Vilna*.

JewishGen announced JOWBR, the JewishGen Online Worldwide Burial Registry database. We may wish to donate Salt Lake City information to this site.

Mary Ann Jacobs requested a copy of the 1878 Map showing Galicia, Austria, from the US Library of Congress. Some copies of this map will be available for the next meeting.

Two Reports from the IAJGS Conference

Robert Neu's Report:

His impression was that much of the conference dealt with Holocaust issues. Monday evening the US Holocaust Museum was open to conference members. The variety of Jewish experiences was explored, with presentations about Ethiopian Jews, Crypo-Jews, Iranian Jews, and South American Jews, among others.

Jews of the Austro-Hungarian Empire often felt dual allegiances or even triplicate allegiances: for example, as Slovak, Austrian, and Jewish or Hungarian, Austrian and Jewish. For many of these Jews, World War II was a rude awakening.

The Ethiopian presenter said that his people can trace their ancestry back eighty generations, but it is an oral tradition, and the Jews are now elderly. An oral history project to record the memories is now underway.

The Red Cross has received Holocaust records from the USSR but remains niggardly regarding publication of the material. Book recommendation: *The Counted Remnant*, about Hungary.

An INS presenter said the INS has files on those who emigrated to the US after 1940. Marelynn added that these immigrants had to register every year with the INS. If you ask for records on an ancestor, ask for ALL records pertaining to that individual. An article by Marelynn in a back-issue of our newsletter has information on INS websites/locations.

Genetics Profile of Jewish Populations: the article makes interesting reading and briefly discusses how Jews got to Europe.

Russian Issues

Rochelle attended two workshops and distributed handouts: Russian Archival Research and Russian and Jewish Encyclopedias.

Aerial Reconnaissance Photographs.

Rochelle attended a workshop on **NARA II.** She distributed Kahn's handout, *Aerial Reconnaissance Photographs in the National* Archives. Rochelle did not find the visit to Archives II, in College Park, MD, useful. She was unprepared; visitors are advised to contact Archives II at least a week ahead of time with expected date of visit and names and coordinates (latitude/longitude) of locations they are interested in. Archives II also has photographs of Europe and the US. She had three other handouts from similar workshops about **Travel to and Finding Your Ancestral Shtetl**.

Rochelle attended an unsatisfying, disorganized and rambling talk on **Where Our Latvian Jewish Ancestors Came From**. The handout is useful for its maps.

Not discussed or distributed at the meeting is the handout for **Beginner's Workshop on Jewish Genealogy**, by Levin Arbeiter. Some of you may find it useful. It's available from Rochelle by e-mail.

This completes our cemetery project, detailing the major Jewish sites in Salt Lake City.
